The Tasman district is under drought conditions.

Here is the latest information from MPI, and some general reminders for anyone affected by fires, coping with drought conditions, and planning ahead in case you become affected.

While the state of emergency declaration has been lifted and notice of transition to recovery has been issued; there is still an extreme fire risk across the Nelson Tasman region and we urge residents to stay on alert and be prepared to evacuate.

This document helps you with some options and contact points.

Stay prepared

Have a plan in place that includes your animals. If you need to evacuate:

- Take pets with you if you can do so safely or take them to a safe place. Do not leave pets in cars.
- If you need to leave animals at your property, make sure they have access to 2-3 days of food and water, are in a safe space (such as a paddock with little to no grass or near a waterway) and can move to avoid danger.
- Consider opening gates within your property so that outdoor animals can move away from the fire. Do not open gates on to roads.
- Remove any flammable or heat-sensitive gear from your animals while the fire risk is still high, especially those with polyester or metal on them like horse rugs and halters.

The Richmond Showgrounds has returned to normal operations – the animal shelter has closed. For concerns about animals, phone the MPI animal welfare line - 0800 00 83 33, (2).

What are my options for stock?

You have some options to help your animals get through a drought in good condition.

If you don't have enough feed or water, buying it in is possible. But plan for the long run. What if there is no rain in a month, for example? What are your trigger points to make decisions?

You might be surprised at how much water animals need per day, especially when the weather is hot. If you can't provide enough food and water to keep your animals healthy and in good condition, you will need to reduce the number of animals on your block.

See if you can have animals moved somewhere with less pressure on water or feed. Talk to friends and neighbours, or speak to Federated Farmers who match grazing and feed needed with offers from farms around the region in adverse events. You will need to arrange a contract with the grazing provider and organise the transport.

Depending on your situation, you may need to look at selling your animals or sending them to the works. There is a list of works and agents below. There can be a backlog of several weeks, and it's easier to sell animals in good condition, so make this decision sooner rather than later.

You will need to arrange transport for them, by you or a transport company, and you must make sure they are in a fit state to transport.

- You can source water from areas where restrictions are not currently in effect. You will
 need to contact a tanker company to arrange this. These sites are already very busy.
- For stock water, you'll need to contact a tanker company / water carrier company to have it delivered. This is at your own cost to take care of your animals.
- Water rationing in Wakefield and Richmond means that water tankers cannot fill up in the normal permitted sites. Tapawera's water site is rationed only for human health needs (by application only), not for stock. Normal permits for Tapawera are no longer valid. Nelson is moving into further rationing and has stopped issuing permits.

TDC reminds people that filling up tanks or containers on the Wakefield and Richmond taps is not permitted. They will take steps to prosecute anyone putting the water supply at risk

Estimated water requirements for animals per day:

Beef cattle:	50 litres/day (yearlings 30 litres/day, calves 20 litres/day)
Dairy:	90 litres/day (for a 450kg cow)
Deer:	15 litres/day (for a 125kg adult)
Sheep:	7 litres/day (adult ewe without lambs)
Goat:	6 litres/day
Horse:	45 litres/day (grazing)
Pig:	15 litres/day (adult with no piglets)

Transporting animals

Work out where your stock will go, then talk to your transporter to make sure they are aware how they will be loaded, and when you will be onsite to help get this done.

The stock you want to transport must be fit for the journey. There are specific requirements and regulations relating to transporting stock. Maintaining NAIT records

Anyone in charge of cattle or deer must comply with NAIT regulations, even if you have just one animal. Register with NAIT http://www.nait.co.nz/nait-basics/farmers-and-lifestylers/ Once you have registered you can apply for a NAIT number, which links you to the property where you are in charge of animals, and is in addition to a herd number. To meet your NAIT requirements, you need to: tag your animals with NAIT approved RFID ear tags; register your animals in the NAIT system; and record and confirm animal movements.

Bisecurity

- Use good normal biosecurity practices for people, vehicles and animals coming on or off farm. https://beeflambnz.com/compliance/biosecurity
- Try and make sure that feed sourced from off-farm is the right quality for your stock and doesn't contain seeds of weeds new to your farm.
- Register receipt of the feed so that if any pest species do slip in it's easy to follow up and resolve later on.
- Farms under controls for *Mycoplasma bovis* can talk to their ICP managers about permits required for moving stock. For any other questions about *Mycoplasma bovis* you can email info@mpi.govt.nz or call MPI on 0800 00 83 33.

Fire suppressant and animal health

While current evidence does not suggest any significant effects of fire suppressants on animals, the chemicals in the suppressants do break down once they are in the soil. One of the break down products is nitrate.

When it rains, pasture plants will take up nitrates just as they do after fertilisers containing nitrogen are applied. This can cause spikes in nitrate levels in the plant material. High levels of nitrate can be toxic to livestock. However, given the short duration of application of the suppressant, the spike is unlikely to be any higher than normal application of diammonium phosphate fertiliser.

We encourage you to be vigilant and recommend:

- if in doubt analyse feeds and forages for nitrate, eg drought-stressed, small-grain
- observe stock frequently
- feed stock on dry hay or mature grass before immature cereal crops or root-crop tops
- feed only well-dried cereal hays
- prevent hungry stock from gorging recently sprayed weeds or highly fertilised crops;
- don't overstock risky pastures / grazing crops, which can result in more stalk material being consumed (the stalk contains the most nitrate in the plant). Avoid strip grazing
- don't graze high-nitrate pastures or crops for seven days after periods of rainfall, cloudy days, frosts, or high temperatures that cause wilting
- don't graze stock on high-nitrate pastures or crops during sunny afternoons (when the temperature is above 15°C) and remove them at night
- prevent access to high-risk weeds around yards/sheds
- feed risky material in small amounts diluted with safe feed, preferably highcarbohydrate feed such as grain (if accustomed to grain feeding), and gradually increasing the amount fed – this applies only to ruminants
- ensure that water does not contain high levels of nitrates
- don't feed green chop that has heated after cutting
- never feed mouldy hay.
